Advaita Ashrama, *Life of Sri Ramakrishna*, 1964, 619 pages.

Compiled from various authentic sources, this book describes the life of a famous mystic. Considered an avatar or incarnation of God by many of his devotees even today, Ramakrishna greatly influenced the Hindu renaissance during 19th and 20th century.

An account of the life of one the greatest occultists of medieval times, as well as of his teachings on cosmology, anthropology, pneumatology, magic and sorcery, medicine, alchemy, astrology, philosophy, and theosophy.

Heehs, Peter, *The Lives of Sri Aurobindo*, c2008, 496 pages.

This book offers personal insights into the life story of a remarkable Native American who, through his own life struggles, learned to unite the paths of warrior and healer. He worked with the American Indian Movement to ensure that his people might live in peace and with respect.

Jensen, Ann Oden, Franz Anton Mesmer: Physician Extraordinaire, 1967, 253 pages.

A dramatic account of the life of this German physician and astrologist, who discovered what he called animal magnetism (often called mesmerism). The evolution of his ideas and practices led later to the development of hypnosis as a medical tool.

Based on ancient sources, this is an account of the life, philosophy, and teachings of an early Gnostic and founder of Simonianism, who, due to his fame as a magician, followers revered as "the Great Power of God" and Christians labeled as a demon in human form.

Mitchell, Robert A., The Buddha: His Life Retold, 1991, 274 pages.

In non-scholarly and poetic language this affectionate and analytical biography captures the spiritual importance and challenges of the Buddha's life and decisions, bringing this historical person to life in all his humanness.
